★ Sonali Ratnasinghe, Executive Director, General Services Foundation



- Sonali Ratnasinghe is a freshman at UNC Chapel Hill and the founder of General Services Foundation, a 501(c)3 teaching youth how to get involved in service at a young age. As the Executive Director, she works with students around Wake County to guide them through service projects impacting any of 40 local nonprofits they can support. Sonali is also the youngest board member of Activate Good, mobilizing the community for people-powered projects for good and is the 2022 Wake County Medallion Award Winner of the Governor's Volunteer Service Award.
- ★ DeLeon Gray, Founder & CEO, Black and Belonging
 - DeLeon Gray is CEO of Black and Belonging (www.blackandbelonging.com) and an associate professor of educational psychology and equity at North Carolina State University, where he has developed three new doctoral courses on School Belonging, Equity-Focused Quantitative Methods and Community-Engaged Approaches to Educational Research. He is enthusiastic about working jointly with education stakeholders to disrupt structural aspects of schooling environments that leave historically marginalized student groups vulnerable to anxieties about belonging.

We told a pretty incredible story through their internal activities and our mutual collaboration. Learn how to tell your own story in a meaningful, enjoyable, and accessible way, while gaining the skills you need to better articulate your work.

- 2. Participants walk gain skills to better articulate their work

Founded in 2010, the award-winning Pivot Point Media specializes in health, education and social empowerment campaigns as a certified vendor with Duke University Hospital System, Johns Hopkins University, The Maya Angelou Center, North Carolina A&T University, Durham County and several nonprofits. Now primarily serving as "the bridge between clients and the creatives", Gil Fitts has been the project manager and executive producer of compelling television and radio commercials, short and long form documentaries and online video campaigns. Professional Track: Preparing Your Organization for Critical Mentoring

Discussions of culturally-relevant mentoring and honoring youth voice and identity has come to the forefront of discussions in the mentoring community recently. But is your program just checking a box or is it truly adding value in this area? To what extent is your organization prepared to implement critical perspectives into program operations?

In this workshop, participants will go beyond discussions related to diversity, equity, and inclusion and instead focus on Critical Mentoring-practical methods mentoring programs can implement that invite youth, families, and community members into program operations that demonstrate and foster accountability to the communities being served.

 - o Barbara Jessie-Black received her BBA from Augusta University in Augusta, GA. During her 15 year career as a retail manager with a national retail chain, Barbara





received her MBA from Meredith College, in Raleigh, NC and became co-founder of a not-for-profit organization whose mission is to search for innovative ways to achieve socio-economic equalities in communities through holistic and entrepreneurship based education. Currently, Barbara is the President/CEO of CommunityWorx (formerly the PTA Thrift Shop, Inc.) whose mission is to enrich lives by building collaborative partnerships and transforming charitable donations into educational and community investments. She is active in both the communities in which she lives and works by serving on several boards and volunteering her time to causes close to her heart, which include workforce and economic development; access to health care; issues of equity, diversity and inclusion, as well as other issues in the social justice space. She is fluent in German, a yoga enthusiast, and includes in her spiritual practice daily meditation and annual silent retreats.

She has extensive experience with leadership development, training and facilitation, and community engagement. Kanalyn has also worked in the non-profit sector providing leadership opportunities and resources to residents in rural North Carolina. It was through that experience that she learned the value of being civically engaged in the community, and it is something that has become important in her career and personal life. Kanalyn holds a B.A in English Literature and Masters of Education from the University of North Carolina at Wilmington. She





enjoys interior decorating, spending time with friends and family, and the occasional candle making.

Youth Track: Youth-Accessible Entrepreneurship: Skills, Stories, and Strategies

Entrepreneurship sounds like peaches and gravy but can be hard when you get down to the brass tacks. How exactly do you start a business, anyways? Learn from Durham locals who exemplify black success and business ownership about the ups and downs of starting an entrepreneurial venture. Justin is originally from Canada, though for many years has considered, Durham, NC home for his partner and two daughters.

Derek Rhodes' professional career has been spent at the intersection of business and community, and his achievements in both are equally significant. As a Black male leader in the corporate world, Derek has an intimate and very much "lived" understanding of the realities of corporate progression as a person of color, and is passionate about inspiring future black leaders to achieve their career aspirations. Before founding the <u>Durham Success Summit</u>, a community organization facilitating education, networking, and workplace opportunities for talented Black men in his hometown, Derek accrued invaluable skills and experience in high-level leadership positions at some of the most recognizable companies in the world including the White House, Google, Microsoft, the Miami Heat, and The Obama Foundation. Derek proudly offers his extensive corporate leadership experience to a number of community organizations including the Duke University Sanford School of Public Policy Board of Visitors, Greater Durham Black Chamber of Commerce Board, and the City of Durham's Racial Equity Commission. Youth Track: How to Build Relationships to Achieve Your Dreams

Participants will learn how to be better mentees and leverage their mentoring relationship to succeed in their daily life.

 - Ron Green began his 20 year career with the Boys & Girls Clubs of North MS. Ron serves on several local, regional, and national boards. Locally he is the Past President of the Rotary Club of Rocky Mount and a Paul Harris Fellow. Nationally he serves as the Dean of the Society of African American Professionals. Ron also serves on the President of Boys & Girls Clubs of America's National Advisory Council and the Board of Directors for the Professional Association of Boys & Girls Clubs workers. He has a certificate of completion for Performance Measurement for Effective Management of Nonprofit Organizations from the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Executive Education at Harvard University, Ron is also a Six Sigma Green Belt. He is a proud member of the Kappa Alpha Psi, Fraternity Inc. Ron attended Stamford University in Birmingham, where he played baseball and football and served in the school Senate. After college he started his five-year professional baseball career in the Chicago Cubs organization. He later graduated from Bethel University in McKenzie, TN. Ron is currently the Chief Executive Officer for the Boys & Girls Clubs of the Tar River Region. He is a National Training Associate for Boys & Girls Clubs of America and a certified Games Master. He lives in Rocky Mount, NC with his wife Robbie. Together they have two children, Channing and London, both students at N.C. A&T.

Youth Track: So, You Want to Work in the Music Industry?

Becoming a musician is the dream of many. But what if you love music and don't want to be a musician or performer? In this session, we will explore the logistical details of the types of careers that are available within and adjacent to the music industry. Participants will hear from a panel of



professionals working in a wide array of music-oriented roles and participate in round-table discussions.

1. Participants will learn about the process of pursuing a career in music and see real-life examples (roundtable discussions)

★ Lord Fess, Musician



Lord Fess, a Durham, NC artist and producer combines intricate detail in lyricism with a sharp delivery and niche cadences over a buffet of smooth, 808-heavy sonic backdrops. Fess attended Durham School of the Arts but dropped out and chose to pursue a street education instead. Fess' music is full of self-reflection, social commentary, anger and confidence and his live show is energetic, captivating and emotional, yet participatory. Fess has opened for multiple national acts on tour across all genres, and recently had a "Rising Rap" mention in the legendary Rolling Stone Magazine.

★ Shana Tucker, Executive Director, Kidznotes



• Shana Tucker is a renowned cellist, singer-songwriter, and teaching artist who embodies the nonprofit's mission to change lives and communities through the power of music. Tucker is a proven leader and advocate whose work with A+ Schools of North Carolina, Wolf Trap Institute for Early Learning Through the Arts, United Arts Council of Raleigh and Wake County, and Durham Arts Council has prepared her to offer keen insight into the organization's core program. Tucker is a remarkable talent who has crisscrossed the globe performing her trademarked ChamberSoul. In between a breakout album and lengthy tenure as resident cellist and vocalist for Cirque du Soleil's KÀ in Las Vegas, Tucker has advocated for future generations of music makers through outreach and engagement efforts with students of all ages. Despite not having seen a cellist who looked like her until she reached her twenties. Tucker benefitted from an era when public school music programs were heavily funded, readily available, and robust—and never looked back. Tucker's eagerness to advance Kidznotes' philosophy of collaboration, inspiration, and change is evidenced by her quick smiles when discussing the opportunity. "As parents," she says, "we see the impact music has on a child's life, and how that transformative power spills out into the community." She continues, "I've witnessed it in all phases of my life in a cycle: as a shy orchestra kid, touring musician, teaching artist, and now, as Executive Director of an organization that centers the power of music to enact change." At Kidznotes, she is inspired by the opportunity to provide music education to students who need it most. Noting that,

★ Josh Rowsey aka "Rowdy", Hip Hop and Education Ph.D. Candidate, UNC Greensboro



Joshua "Rowdy" Rowsey is an underground North Carolina recording artist, actor/improviser, and writer who has been featured on NPR, DJ Booth, and Indy Week. Joshua is a founding member of the national hip hop collective "No9to5 Music". He initiated the UNC-Chapel Hill cypher, which was nominated for an Indy Week award for best place to listen to Hip Hop in the Triangle. Durham-based rapper and hip-hop artist Rowdy, known to his friends and family as Kevin Joshua "Josh" Rowsey Jr. is using his music to introduce a bridge for the gaps in a North Carolina still somewhat divided by rampant race and income politics.

★ Bill Murphy, Digital Sales Manager, Urban One, Inc.



Over the course of a robust career that has included Executive-level training and Professional Certification in a diverse array of marketing disciplines, Bill Murhpy has acquired the expertise necessary to help his clients successfully navigate the rapidly evolving landscape of today's marketing challenges. Bill's career has included extensive time with radio, over a decade of talent-buying, and event planning and promotion.

Zaid Steele, aka ZPEEZE, is a student at Shaw University and "Ms. CEO" of Who Can Rap On That Beat. They started their business in October 2020, inspired by their grade-school experiences playing various instruments and writing songs. At Shaw University, Zaid is an Ambassador Intern at the Center of Racial Justice. Zaid operates Who Can Rap On That Beat to meet artists, for the culture, and to bring people together with music.

Professional Track: How to Engage: Advocacy and Elected Officials

When trust in our government is low, how can we lean into local politics to make more of a difference in our communities? How can grassroots, small, and local organizations advance their missions through policy? Learn how local organizations and activists can engage politicians at the local and state level to affect support for their work and how we have achieved this historically.

Goals

- 1. Participants will learn about ways that elected officials across the aisle have supported initiatives related to youth development/mentoring
- 2. Participants will learn how mentoring programs can engage elected officials at the local and state levels to support their work

Speakers

★ Jamal Stroud, Founder, Big Homie Lil Homie Mentoring



- Jamal Stroud, founder of **Big Homie Lil Homie Mentoring**, a mentoring program for young boys growing up without father figures. On a national level, Jamal works as the Mentor and Outreach Manager for Camp HOPE America, where he provides technical assistance to 40 different programs throughout the United States. Jamal has been recognized locally and nationally for the lasting impact on more than 10,000 youth, offering support and positive male role models for young people in South Carolina. Jamal's personal experience growing up in the foster care system and living in six different homes by the time he was six years old led him to the front lines of improving and advocating for youth. Jamal has been a guest on The Ellen Show and has received numerous awards, including winning the prestigious Jefferson Award and the Public Elevation from MENTOR.
- ★ Camille Berry, Mentor, Blue Ribbon Mentor Advocate; Member, Chapel Hill Town Council
 - o Camille Berry works as a consultant to both for-profit and nonprofit leaders. She shares with her clients her decades of experience in cultivating relationships that are built upon collaboration, curiosity, and integrity. For nearly seven years, Camille worked with Community Home Trust to secure resources for its work in increasing and maintaining affordable housing. That work was deeply meaningful to Camille as she and her children had faced housing insecurity for several years prior to her joining the nonprofit organization. Previously, Camille served as executive director with Durham Central Park, Inc. where she led a band of volunteers in redeveloping an urban wasteland into green space used for community gathering space — a









result of a public-private partnership. Her vision to create a weekly marketplace destination by closing the street and making it a pedestrian mall on Saturday mornings was a success and continues to grow in attracting locals and visitors. Camille is mother to three adult children (Jasmine, Allegra, and Anthony), an active alumna of Wellesley College, and past president of the Chapel Hill-Carrboro Sunrise Rotary Club. A North Carolina native, she returned with her family to her home state and settled in southern Orange County in 2005. All three of her children attended and graduated from Carolina Friends School, a school that was founded to to be different by design — purposefully integrated, student-oriented, and radically equal. Continuing the legacy of her ancestors, Camille serves in a variety of ways that foster a sense of belonging through opportunities and fellowship. True to her family's ethos and the mottos of her alma mater and Rotary, Camille has found great purpose in service to her community. That continues with her election to the Chapel Hill Town Council.

- ★ Jovonia Lewis, Executive Director, EPiC Empowered Parents in Community; Member, Durham Public Schools Board of Education
 - Jovonia Lewis is a nationally certified and licensed clinical mental health counselor (LCMHC). With an undergraduate degree in psychology and human development and family studies from UNC-Greensboro and Master of Science degree in counseling education with a specialization in family therapy from Georgia State University, Jovonia has always been centered around education and a growth mindset to heal, empower and liberate others. Through EPiC, she continues to offer educational opportunities for students and parents, and hosts racial equity conversations and forums for increasing accountability around policy and practice. In addition to the non-profit service, Jovonia has served on the Board of Durham Council PTA, her sons' school's PTA, Durham Public Schools Foundation, Durham Committee on the Affairs of Black People's Education Committee and the City of Durham's Race Equity Task Force. She also served on the Equity and Whole Child Advisory Committee for DPS. In 2020, Jovonia campaigned for a seat on the board of education in Durham. She was elected and sworn in as a School Board member with Durham Public School's Board of Education in July 2020.



More than a buzzword, "collective impact" has evolved into a fully formed framework for creating systems-level change. As CEO of a quarterback organization, Yvette's work involves shaping and leading strategies, attracting and leveraging investment, building relationships with residents and the community, and cultivating cross-sector partnerships to improve the quality of life and create opportunities for Southeast Raleigh residents, small businesses and non-profits. As a thoughtful leader, Yvette comes to SERP with over 30 years of experience as a nonprofit administrator, fund raiser, and public and civic engagement specialist. She provides direct support and supervision to family advocates while supporting and promoting DCI's board and executive strategic vision for the current and future state of the organization as part of the county-wide ecosystem that supports academic, socioemotional, and workforce growth and achievement. LeQuandra comes to DCI with a diverse 23-year career in Social Work and Education. Her mission is to develop leaders, programs, and initiatives that promote and enhance the social, emotional, and educational betterment of youth, families, and communities. She has served in multiple capacities and across multiple systems as a leader of various non-profits in multiple capacities with a focus on gang outreach, juvenile justice, mental health, youth programming, child sexual abuse prevention, advocacy, and racial equity.

Every first and third Wednesday at The Pinhook in Durham, Blends With Friends hosts a free open decks night where anyone can sign up to play a short set on CDJs, turntables, or their own equipment. Blends With Friends also runs a synthesizer petting zoo at events and operates a free music equipment lending library to give people hands-on experience with music-making tools. At the Carolinas Youth Mentoring Symposium, we'll be running an open decks DJ booth where participants will learn the basics of how to DJ in Traktor and play a short set. Symposium participants include members of Blends with Friends Patrick Phelps-McKeown aka Treee City and Peter Daaleman aka Bardo Bloom.







Closing Plenary

Healing-Centered Mentoring: An Urgent Conversation

According to new data from the CDC, more than a third of students reported they experienced poor mental health during the COVID-19 pandemic, with the highest levels coming from BIPOC students. While mentoring programs have historically been relied on to provide young people with academic and mental health support, mentors generally do not receive formal training or targeted skills practice to promote psychological and behavioral healing. Further, educational institutions across the country are overwhelmed with students struggling with mental health challenges and are ill-equipped to support student well-being at the levels required. This trend will continue or get worse unless substantial changes are made in how mental health services are provided.

How can mentoring be used as a strategy to reduce mental health stigma and support a wide range of meaningful outcomes for young people? What is required for mentoring to reduce the burden on existing systems of care, and reduce barriers to mental health services, particularly for BIPOC young people?

Join us for a conversation about Healing-Centered Mentoring, a framework that will build the capacity of mentors and mentoring programs to support clinical services while developing a relationship ecosystem that promotes the healing and well-being of individuals, families, and communities-at-large.

Goals

In this conversation, participants will

- Learn the connections between mental health and well-being to academic achievement and life outcomes
- Be introduced to elements of the Healing-Centered Mentoring framework
- See examples of how to increase the number of youth receiving evidence-based mental health services through technology

He grew up in St. Louis, MO and experienced depression which was triggered by high-stress environments. Marcus has since dedicated his life to a career in education to ensure that the highest-need students receive the support they need to be successful.
